Japanese Wax Resist Dyeing Workshop Sandra Lee Chandler

Students will have the opportunity to experience the traditional Japanese craft of roketsuzome dyeing, where they can choose from various designs to create an unforgettable art piece.

ROKETSU is a traditional textile dyeing method used in Kyoto, also known as wax-resist dyeing. In this method, wax is applied to a cotton fabric to create a design. When the fabric is dyed in indigo, the areas where wax has been applied block the dye and leave those areas white. The ROKETSU DYEING process involves more than 20 steps if the traditional method is used. Students will create 3 to 4 roketsuzome dyeing pieces.
